Canadians on Musk, Twitter, and everything in between.

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REPORT



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Context

In April 2022, Elon Musk made a \$43 billion offer to buy Twitter. Within the last couple of weeks, this deal concluded, placing Musk at the helm of the social media organization. We fielded a survey back in April to understand public sentiment on this deal. Last week, we fielded a similar study to see whether these sentiments have changed over time.

Methodology

Between Nov 4-8, Angus Reid Group surveyed a representative sample of n=1,502 Canadian adults. The sample frame was balanced and weighted on age, gender, and education according to the latest census data. For comparison purposes only, a probability sample of this size would yield a margin of error of +/- 2.5 percentage points, 19 times out of 20. The survey was fielded in English and French

The net opinion:

There is an increased perception that Musk's ownership is a "bad thing" for Twitter. Almost half of Canadians see it that way.

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Negative outlooks on Musk's ownership have increased 8 percentage **points since April**
